As one of the founding "Fabled Eight", Steve has never missed an Event through the first 16 years of the MIGS. For many years, Steve helped Woody in selecting and procuring the annual Tournament Gift. He has accumulated 17 Matchplay victories, 3 Calcutta wins, 2 SMC Runner-ups, 1 High Net, 1 Individual Team Championship, 4 Low Nets, and 3 SMC Titles. His 2013 Low Net pushed him over the top to receive the honor of being the first Summit Hall of Fame Inductee. In 2014, Steve became only the second Player in Summit history to pass \$1,000 in career earnings.

Steve is a family man and pharmaceutical rep for Pfizer Pharmaceuticals. He is deeply involved with his church and, in particular, shaping the lives of young people through his senior youth group leadership. In addition to his role as Virginia Tech football's 'Red Hat', he manages to find time to referee Volleyball and Wrestling for which he was recently inducted into the Roanoke Valley Wrestling Hall of Fame, and now serves as Commissioner of the Roanoke Valley Wrestling Association. The Summit Hall of Fame represents Steve's 3rd hall of fame induction, as he is also a member of the Patrick Henry High School Sports Hall of Fame for his exploits on the mat and gridiron. In his spare time, Steve excels, not only in golf, but pool, bowling, and, much to his surprise, darts. He is also, possibly, the 3rd or 4th best Cornhole player at the Summit. Plan to arrive at the Grand Strand by noon on the afternoon of Friday, March 11, 2016 if you plan to participate in the practice round at beautiful Myrtlewood Palmetto arranged and negotiated exclusively for Summit Participants by the Committee. We will checkout prior to the final round on the morning of Tuesday, March 15, 2016.

In addition to the aforementioned accommodations, tournament entry fee includes four Tournament rounds of golf with cart on four luxurious Grand Strand area courses, some free range balls, tournament banquet, tournament gifts/souvenirs, taxes/tips, and over \$1,000 in daily and Tournament cash prizes.

Balance of entry fee is due one month prior to the event — February 12, 2016 (As in AWHILE AGO!). Final payment of should be made payable to Bart Edmunds via Paypal at jed-munds@cox.net or a check can be mailed to P.O. Box 20392, Roanoke, VA 24018.

Over \$100.00 in prize-money will be awarded each day with another \$250 awarded to the individual winners on the final day of the Summit.

Afternoon rounds are the responsibility of individual participants for those interested in prolonging the experience. The only additional expenses relate to out-of-pocket expenditures for food, drinks, souvenirs, the Calcutta, wagers and side-action, and/or entertainment (if you like that sort of thing).

Handicapping, etc.

The Summit Handicap System®

Initial handicaps have been determined by calculating 90% of last year's tournament ending handicap. Individual handicaps will be adjusted daily by one-third (33%) of the difference between a participant's actual score and his most recent handicap.

EXAMPLE: 2016 Ending Handicap = 11. 2017 Initial Handicap: $11 \times 90\% = 10$. 10 handicapper shoots 14 over par. Adjustment would be 1.33 ((14-10=4)/3=1.33), rounded down to 11.

Amendment 2016-01: TIE-BREAKER: The first till breaker will be the person who LED for the most holes during the course of the nat. h.

Amendment 2014-01: Participants receiving a bye in the Play-in Round, will receive only 1/2 of the customary handicap adjustment as a result of their Day One score.

Amendment 2010-01: FOR HANDICAPPING PURPOSES ONLY, once a match is closed-out, neither competitor may score more than a bogey on any remaining hole in that round

Amendment 2009-01: FOR HANDICAPPING PURPOSES ONLY, no more than a double-bogey will be counted on any individual hole for single-digit handicappers, and no more than a triple-bogey will be counted on any individual hole for double-digit handicappers.

General Information

- 1. USGA rules prevail
- 2. No mulligans
- 3. Ball may be moved one club-length in *own* fairway
- 4. When in doubt about lost or out-of-bounds ball, play provisional
- 5. Double-par stroke limit per hole (No limit for match play purposes)
- 6. In case of rules disagreement, play second ball. Committee will decide after the round
- 7. Tie breaking procedure:
 - A. Most holes led in match
 - B. Last three holes
 - C. Last six holes
 - D. Back nine
 - E. Low net for round
 - F. Low net on *randomly* drawn hole(s)
 - G. Two out of three "Rock, Paper, Scissors" (no dynamite... that's silly).

Upon arrival at Myrtlewood, it was out of the car and straight to the tee! On the ride down, there was quite a bit of chatter about who was longer off the tee— Bart or Steve—, so they agreed to compete in rounds they played together. Bart seemed amused, but was happy to put an end to the debate, but his advisors pointed out that starting in the practice round gave Steve an unfair advantage as Bart had not hit a single ball since the fall, whereas Steve had been practicing all winter. They never played together again, so the verdict remains a mystery to this day.

There was no formal action pre-arranged for the practice round, so the various groups simply loaded up and teed-off without fanfare. All agreed that next year, we needed to put someone with gumption and creativity in charge of organizing something to spice-up the practice round. With nothing on the line, Steve decided to 'let his hair down' and unwind. After two beers, he proclaimed that he was "hammered" and that he had "fixed [his] chipping". Saturday was a beautiful day at Grande Dunes (for a change), though it began with a touch of drama between two of our stronger willed competitors, Bo and Greg. The two had words as Bo took umbrage at Greg's attempt to assume a fiduciary role in Bo's finances. Apparently, the day before, Greg beat the brakes off Bo, but declined Bo's request for an opportunity to recoup his losses by saying he thought he would just "keep [his] profits". While this response naturally set Bo off, Greg pointed out to Bo that he was actually doing him a favor and saving him money by refusing his bet. In the end, they agreed to disagree and both explored wagers elsewhere, though from that seed of discontent, has grown a beautiful, budding friendship.



In the first group, John beat the rookie, Hudson 7/6, emphasizing, once again, the difficulty many fish experience when they suddenly find themselves swimming in the big pond (bless their littlefish hearts!). In the second group, Phil throttled Summit veteran, Jeff Parker, 6/5. Group 3, saw super sophomore, Greg, thump former SMC Champ, Chris 6/5, while Ken was at least able to keep it respectable in his 4/2 loss to the first ever 2 -Time SMC Champion, Bart. The 4-man Stableford was won by the team of Mike, Steve, Jeff, and Phil with 123 points, while the other two teams tied with 110 points each. Word on the street was that Bo and Phil played very well, while Jeff struggled to get his ball airborne most of the round. Steve proclaimed that he had 'cured' his chipping woes. Bart got the holes mixed-up, so everyone ended up playing the silver tees on the par 5, which, actually, worked out okay, as it brought an entirely different element into play off the tee, and Chris carded the first net double eagle in the history of the Summit.

Saturday afternoon was typically lazy as various groups went their separate ways. While most went back to their villas to nap, Steve did his usual two hours at the PGA Superstore, and ended up buying nothing for himself. He did, however, purchase a new hybrid for Chris, which was, evidently, damaged because, as Chris attempted to use it, he found that the clubface was incapable of touching the ball. Along with the 6:00 Calcutta in Bart's room, Matchplay losers were offered consolation prizes, and afterward, groups went in different directions for dinner. A smaller group decided to go out for a bit, but everyone else stayed in to watch basketball and call it a night. All in all, it was a fairly quiet evening.



Day Two of the Summit was at TPC of Myrtle Beach. In the end it proved to be too difficult a course for the group as a whole, and, it was agreed, that we'll probably not play there again, or, if we do, we'll play shorter tees. The first match of the day was Bart vs Bo. Bo was hot. Bart was not. Bo won 4/2. Jeff, who was not in a match, had another rough day and struggled

throughout, while Hudson, sans performance anxiety, rose to the occasion and parlayed his silky-smooth swing to a good round for him.

In the second Match, John made a clutch putt on the final hole to tie the Match, but Mike won the newly-modified tiebreaker. There was much discussion surrounding the tiebreaker system and whether or not to have playoff. It was Bo that pointed out that, in a handicapped event like the Summit, a playoff is difficult, if not impossible, to implement fairly. In the end, we agreed that a paper tiebreaker is probably going to be the best approach, though the 'most holes led approach' is not the answer. While often called into question (coincidentally, always by the loser), a team of consultants confirmed that the traditional Summit tiebreaker checklist is the most equitable handicapped event tie-breaker ever conceived by the collective golfing think-tank since Old Tom Morris first pushed his peg in the ground. In light of their findings and unable to organize a meaningful opposition to the 'consultants', the Summit will revert to its former, tried-and-true tie-breaker system that served it well for 16 years before being upended by naïve newcomers.

Reports from the third group indicate that Greg's lips were beginning to turn a blue from lack of oxygen as early as the first tee, as he went on to shoot a big number and suffer a 6/5 spanking at the hands of his dominatrix, Steve. 
The winning 2-Best Ball team was Bo, Bart, Jeff,

and Hudson at –4, with Bo and Hudson both posting birdies on the final hole to secure the victory. The other two teams tied at –1.

Everyone went to Burro Loco for dinner that night, except for Mike who wandered off by himself for some alone time. In a surprise twist, Steve had one jumbo margarita, one Texas margarita, and was three sheets to the wind by the time the group arrived back







at the villas for the Yankee's swap.

The Yankee Swap has a way of revealing a person's character. Not so much in the case of Steve who dozed off, but was able to revive long enough to mumble appreciation for his sweet Transamerica ball mark set. Others were either too starstruck or lilv-livered (take your pick) to take a prize they desperately wanted from their hero/ mentor. The International World Tour on Day Three was generally considered an enjoyable course, though many complained (as they are

known to do) that the course wasn't anything special and that the holes didn't resemble those which they were supposed to represent. It was, however, in good shape, and most very much enjoyed the variety.

The two Matches of the day were Ben vs Bo, and Steve vs Mike. Ben somehow duct-taped his round together and forced a tiebreaker, which, much to his horror, he won, and advanced to the Finals. [Editor's Note: Sources close to the matter say that once the reality of what he'd done set in, Ben offered to forfeit his win, so that Bo could advance to 'his rightful place' in the Finals.] Apparently, Ben had a three up lead with four holes to play, lost his lead, but was able to hang on for the win— avenging his thrashing in the 2012 Finals at the hands of his hero/mentor, Bo, and advancing to his second SMC Finals in five years. Ben was overheard saying that he could barely breathe on the 18th tee before piping his drive 300 yards down the middle

and securing the victory.

Steve and Mike's Match came down to the wire, with Mike winning one up despite spotting Steve two shots. Steve had been chirpy about who was the best player at the Summit, but was able to solidify his position. There can be very little argument, going forward, that there are very few lefthanders better than Steve.

In the 2-Man Stableford, Ken and Steve won with 73 points, with Bart and

Hudson finishing second at 68. Two teams tied for third, but no one wrote down their scores.

Hudson won the Calcutta in his Summit debut, with Steve and Bo tying for second. In an unprecedented sweep, Hudson actually owned both Steve and Bo. This year, it looked as if a spot could open up, paving the way for the return of one of the Summit's founding Great Eight, Joe Assaid, but we were able to keep our entire 2016 lineup intact for another year. Readers may recall that Joe withdrew several years back for personal reasons and to explore his heritage. We wish Joe the best, and hope to see him back someday.

Another Summit alum waiting to come off the bench is Ryan Crush— arguably one of the top four golfers ever to play in the Summit. As many are aware, Ryan recently lost a long, brave battle with matrimony. Sadly, he was engaged this past January, ending an epic run of bachelorhood not likely to be challenged in the heterosexual world for quite a while. Ryan will be sorely missed by his male

friends with whom he used to do guy things. You fought the good fight, my friend! You were an inspiration to us all.

Sometimes, less is more. Though ever-changing like a river, the heart of the Sum-

mit remains strong, and its future glows bright. There has been talk in recent years of pairing the field back to it's original eight— talk that has gained traction. Other than the two aforementioned subs waiting in the wings, it's highly likely that future openings will not be filled as we scale back to a kinder, gentler group of eight players. The Committee is hard at work, as we speak, on variations of our favorite, traditional Summit games with less than twelve, or worse yet, an odd number. While more manageable, a group of eight also affords opportunities to certain, deserving players that have been on ice since around 2008. More on this later.

The Summit remains the top amateur match play event on the east coast, and the current group is as good as any in its illustrious history. We've got several former athletes and at least two former ladies'

men. We've got brains and brawn, good golfers and some other really good guys. We have four in the financial industry, four in the medical field, and two entrepreneurs (one of which, no one really understands what exactly he does). We've got two of the top left-handers in southwest Virginia and one of the top left-wingers in the mid-Atlantic. We have some men of few words, and at least one that makes up for it.
