


A Word from the Director



Stranger Things

Summit 18 began like any other. John and Mike went down Wednesday for some 'us' time. John followed Thursday in his truck loaded with 10 boxes of gifts and prizes. Per Summit ritual, Bo, Phil, and Ben met Bart, Steve, and Greg at Clarence's. Jeff, Ken, and Chris converged from opposite directions, but Jeff and Chris arrived too late for practice round. After the round, the group split for dinner with half going to King Kong Sushi and the other half going to PF Chang's. Chris was sick, and Jeff got lost, so neither of them joined. The accommodations were fantastic, and we spent

the remainder of the night laughing, drinking, and watching ACC Tournament.

John, in one of the Summit's great comebacks, clawed-back from 5 down after 11 holes to beat Ken 2 down. The victory was not without controversy, when Ken landed his ball amidst an oddly placed series of O.B. and hazard stakes. John insisted Ken play two balls. Some called it bad luck, some called it gamesmanship, either way, Ken was done after that and limped to the finish line. Jeff beat John Hudson 4/3 en route to shooting 100 and leading Low Net with a net 70. In the final match/pillow-fight of the day, Chris knocked-off Phil 4/3.

The par 4 from the ladies tees, known as the 'Twist', was a big hit and saw it's share of big

numbers as many tried in vain to drive the green. The 4-Man Stableford was won by the team of Bo/Steve/Jeff/Hudson with a score of 156, followed by Bart/Greg/Ken/John at 113.

Everyone except Steve went to the Overtime Sports Café to settle wagers and grab a post-round snack. Meanwhile, Steve spent 2 hours in the PGA Superstore by himself and emerged with nothing but a handful of coupons to Capt. George's and Benjamin's Calabash Seafood buffet.

bed.





buys a round of drinks for the group. This year, as owner of Phil, Ben decided to start a new tradition and volunteered to

dig into his own pocket and co-sponsor the round of drinks. After eating and drinking Phil and Ben's drinks, everyone headed back to the condos to get cleaned-up for the Yankee Swap. Always a fun event, but not without its share of controversy, Ben created quite a stir when he interjected himself into John's negotiation with Ken. John offered Ken a dozen Titlest NXTs plus \$10 for Ken's dozen Pro Vxs. Ken was poised to accept the deal when Ben whispered that he should hold out for \$15. Ken immediately backed-off, and John refused to offer more on principle. John refused to speak to Ben for the remainder of the evening. In one of the most grueling rounds of golf ever recorded at the Summit, the final group rolled-in *1 hour* after the second group, who, by then, had finished eating and gotten their

check. Hudson didn't even wait around for Awards presentation before bolting to get back for family obligations. It was a rough day for Chris, whose round was characterized by one tee-shot that actually hit the tee marker before dribbling off the front of the tee. He ultimately lost 5/4, as Greg coasted to his first, and likely only, SMC Championship.

Much has been said about Greg's accomplishment and what it means for the disenfranchised everywhere. It speaks of what America has to offer those less fortunate or not blessed with any particular abilities. In America, anyone who sets their mind to it can accomplish something, whether it's becoming President or building a log cabin out of popsicle sticks. Greg reminded us of



that, and, for that, we all owe him a debt of gratitude. So, thank you, Greg, and congratulations on winning the 2017 MIGS Title— no one can ever say you never accomplished anything.

Now, even with Summit 19 staring us in the face, the Tournament Committee has already begun looking ahead to the 20th anniversary of the Millennial Invitational Golf Summit in 2019. In recognition and celebration of this auspicious event, several select venues are currently under consideration and will be discussed further at this year's event. As usual, only those possessing extraordinary skills and those grandfathered in or who are friends with someone already in the Tournament will be selected to participate.

In the meantime, find out if Ben and John can shake the monkey from their backs, if Hudson will win a Summit match, and if lightening can strike twice in the same spot. All this and more at the 2018 Summit!














The Summit Hall of Fame

Inducted 2014

As one of the founding "Fabled Eight", Steve has never missed an Event through the first 16 years of the MIGS. For many years, Steve helped Woody in selecting and procuring the annual Tournament Gift. He has accumulated 17 Matchplay victories, 3 Calcutta wins, 2 SMC Runner-ups, 1 High Net, 1 Individual Team Championship, 4 Low Nets, and 3 SMC Titles. His 2013 Low Net pushed him over the top to receive the honor of being the first Summit Hall of Fame Inductee. In 2014, Steve became only the second Player in Summit history to pass \$1,000 in career earnings.

Steve is a family man and pharmaceutical rep for Pfizer Pharmaceuticals. He is deeply in-

volved with his church and, in particular, shaping the lives of young people through his senior youth group leadership. In addition to his role as Virginia Tech football's 'Red Hat', he manages to find time to referee Volleyball and Wrestling for which he was recently inducted into the Roanoke Valley Wrestling Hall of Fame, and now serves as Commissioner of the Roanoke Valley Wrestling Association. The Summit Hall of Fame represents Steve's 3rd hall of fame induction, as he is also a member of the Patrick Henry High School Sports Hall of Fame for his exploits on the mat and gridiron. In his spare time, Steve excels, not only in golf, but pool, bowling, and, much to his surprise, darts. He is also, possibly, the 3rd or 4th best Cornhole player at the Summit. Please take a moment to extend your congratulations to Steve on attainment of this tremendous milestone in his life.

Lodging & Arrangements

Participants will share one of three luxury 4-bedroom resort condominiums conveniently situated in the heart of Myrtle Beach, SC. Each Margate Plantation condo comes equipped with electricity, indoor plumbing, and cable television. Also, guest may enjoy access to The Sport and Health Club located at the nearby Embassy Suites Hotel.

Plan to arrive at the Grand Strand by noon on the afternoon of Friday, March 16, 2018 if you plan to participate in the practice round at beautiful Myrtle Beach National South course arranged and negotiated exclusively for Summit Participants by the Committee. We will check-out prior to the final round on the morning of Tuesday, March 20, 2018.

In addition to the aforementioned accommodations, tournament entry fee includes four Tournament rounds of golf with cart on three luxurious Grand Strand area courses, some free range balls, tournament banquet, tournament gifts/souvenirs, taxes/tips, and over \$1,000 in daily and Tournament cash prizes.

Balance of entry fee is due one month prior to the event — February 16, 2018 (As in AWHILE AGO!). Final payment of should be made payable to Bart Edmunds via Paypal at jed-munds@cox.net or a check can be mailed to P.O. Box 20392, Roanoke, VA 24018.

Over \$100.00 in prize-money will be awarded each day with another \$250 awarded to the individual winners on the final day of the Summit.

Afternoon rounds are the responsibility of individual participants for those interested in prolonging the experience. The only additional expenses relate to out-of-pocket expenditures for food, drinks, souvenirs, the Calcutta, wagers and side-action, and/or entertainment (if you like that sort of thing).

Handicapping, etc.

The Summit Handicap System®

Initial handicaps have been determined by calculating 90% of last year's tournament ending handicap. Individual handicaps will be adjusted daily by one-third (33%) of the difference between a participant's actual score and his most recent handicap.

EXAMPLE: 2017 Ending Handicap = 11. 2018 Initial Handicap: $11 \times 90\% = 10$. 10 handicapper shoots 14 over par. Adjustment would be 1.33 ((14-10=4)/3=1.33), rounded down to 11.

Amendment 2014-01: Participants receiving a bye in the Play-in Round, will receive only 1/2 of the customary handicap adjustment as a result of their Day One score.

Amendment 2010-01: FOR HANDICAPPING PURPOSES ONLY, once a match is closed-out, neither competitor may score more than a bogey on any remaining hole in that round

Amendment 2009-01: FOR HANDICAPPING PURPOSES ONLY, no more than a double-bogey will be counted on any individual hole for single-digit handicappers, and no more than a triple-bogey will be counted on any individual hole for double-digit handicappers.

General Information

- 1. USGA rules prevail
- 2. No mulligans
- 3. Ball may be moved one club-length in *own* fairway
- 4. When in doubt about lost or out-of-bounds ball, play provisional
- 5. Double-par stroke limit per hole (No limit for match play purposes)
- 6. In case of rules disagreement, play second ball. Committee will decide after the round
- 7. Tie breaking procedure:
 - A. Most holes led in match
 - B. Last three holes
 - C. Last six holes
 - D. Back nine
 - E. Low net for round
 - F. Low net on *randomly* drawn hole(s)
 - G. Two out of three "Rock, Paper, Scissors" (no dynamite... that's silly).

Daily Contests

TOTAL PURSE: \$144.00

- Classic \$2.00/hole skins game with carryovers
- Skins awarded for winning a hole outright versus the field.
- Orphaned skins at the end of a rounds 1-3 will be carried to the next day
- Orphaned skins at the end of the round 4 will be awarded to the individual winning the most skins for the tournament
- Skins will be paid at the end of each round
- Full handicaps will be used in this event.

STABLEFORD (4-Man/2-Man)

TOTAL PURSE: \$100.00

Points are awarded to team based on individuals' scores as follows:

DUAL-DAY, DOUBLE-DUDE DUEL

TOTAL PURSE: \$90.00

(1st: \$60/2nd: \$30)

- At the conclusion of Round 2, two-man teams will be objectively determined for the final two rounds in this net best ball event.
- Best individual score each hole is used to determine team score. Team with the lowest total net best-ball team score for the final thirty-six holes wins.
- No tie-breaker. All ties split the purse.
- Full handicaps will be used in this event.

FACE-OFF

Interview with a Champion

An Underdog Story

Not since Sean Astin donned an Irish helmet of gold to play the title role in Rudy has a more inspiring underdog story emerged than Dr. Greg Beato's unlikely theft of the crown jewel of amateur golf— the Summit Matchplay Championship. Once every decade or so, an alignment of circumstances and planets creates an opportunity for someone seen by most as no more than a marginal participant to compete, if only for a of blink of time's eye, at a level far above their ability and capture a victory otherwise and forevermore out of their reach. This is one of those stories. Lest our readers think this a work of fiction, our staff endeavored to secure a personal interview with the 2017 SMC Champion himself, Dr. Greg Beato, to hear, firsthand, how this miracle unfolded. Our guest writer, Ralph Macchio, took time off the set of his latest movie, *Karate Kid: Remember What I Did Back in 1984?*, to visit with Greg in his palatial home in the mountains of southwest Virginia. Below is a transcript of that inspirational conversation.

RM: How does it feel to join the ranks of Summit Champions?

GB: It's an honor and I'm seriously humbled. It's something no one can ever take away from me— plus, it'll be immortalized in The Book, which is cool.

RM: Were you surprised that '17 was your breakthrough year? Why or why not?

GB: I had ZERO expectations of winning the Summit this year [Editor's Note: This is an example of Greg's humility. Pre-Tournaments odds of him winning were 37-1, so his chances were actually more like 2.7%, not zero]. I always compete and love having matches and competition, so I knew I'd be tough to play, but didn't really think I'd win four matches in a row. I seriously had no clue how my back would fair, but didn't really want to make that into a big deal or excuse. I think the back ended up keeping me from trying stupid sh*t and [kept] me playing conservatively.

RM: What does it take to win the Summit?

GB: Consistency for four rounds. Since the handicapping [SHS[®]] is pretty solid, you really cannot have an off round and expect to ad-





SouthCreek at Myrtle Beach National

As one of three courses in the prestigious Myrtle Beach National family, Southcreek has its own distinct character that has made it a hit among local and visiting golfers alike.

This Arnold Palmer signature course is one of a kind in the Myrtle Beach area, incorporating the scenic terrain of hardwood forest and Low-

country wetlands into the legendary golfer/designer's blueprints.

The SouthCreek Course at Myrtle Beach National is the shortest of the three courses at Myrtle Beach National Golf Club and features waste bunkers, dogleg fairways and undulating Mini Verde greens. Measuring at only 6,400 yards from the back tees, Southcreek calls for accuracy and finesse over sheer strength and force, making it a challenging course for golfers of all handicaps.

This course requires accuracy off the tee, but if achieved can offer good scoring opportunities throughout your round. It features the dramatic par-5 10th hole that wraps as a dogleg right around a large lake; the par-3 13ththat showcases a small green with a large waste bunker leading up to it; and the par-4 finishing hole at 18, measuring 380 yards from the tips and playing as a dogleg left with a steep-faced bunker fronting the green requiring a forced carry to the green.

Given a lack of distance combined with beautifully maintained terrain and a stellar background, it's of little surprise that the **SouthCreek Course at Myrtle Beach National** has found itself honored by voting panels recognizing top rounds for women and seniors. Golf Digest awarded Southcreek 4 stars in its exclusive "Places to Play" rankings, and the course was voted among the "Top 100 in America" by Golf for Women.



Myrtlewood Golf Club Palmetto Course

Lush Fairways and Excellent Greens Make This Arthur Hills Course a Must Play. Home to 36 holes of championship Myrtle Beach golf, Myrtlewood Golf Club is set along the beautiful Intracoastal Waterway in the heart of Myrtle Beach.

Myrtlewood Palmetto golf course has a traditional design that offers gentle sloping fairways with a variety of hazards, bunkers and large, subtle undulating greens. Palmetto is consistently ranked as one of the top repeatplay courses along the Grand Strand.

The Palmetto Course offers well-manicured tifdwarf Bermuda grass greens and fairways sur-

rounded by scenic vistas of the Waterway and surprisingly serene woodlands that make it hard to believe you are playing so near downtown Myrtle Beach. The Palmetto Course is a great challenge for golfers of any skill level and presents players with a relaxed Low-country setting that is such a part of the coastal South Carolina lifestyle.



King's North at Myrtle Beach National

One of three premier layouts at Myrtle Beach National Golf Club, King's North is an Arnold Palmer-designed gem offering several of the Grand Strand's most memorable holes.

Redesigned by "The King" in 1996, King's North made its way onto Golf Digest's prestigious list of "America's 100 Greatest Public Courses - 2004", and Golf Digest's "Places to Play" has awarded it 4.5 STARS ever since.

King's North features 18 of the most dramatic and picturesque holes you'll ever encounter. The par-5 6th hole (nicknamed "The Gambler") features an island fairway

that offers a "risk-reward" shortcut to the green. If the island fairway is chosen it could leave a good chance at going for this green in two, thus the "Gamble." However, a safe layup to the right and a short approach over water will always keep you guessing. The par-3, island green 12th hole creates a challenge of its own. Arcadian Shores Golf Club was designed by renowned golf course architect, Rees Jones. The uniquely contoured fairways and green complexes with an abundance of live oaks and well placed lakes, give this course a personality all its own. Located in the heart of Myrtle Beach, South Carolina, Arcadian Shores is a quick trip from all area accommodations. The convenience of location makes this course a regular choice for all visiting golfers and a local's favorite.

At just over 6800 yards from the tips

with a rating of 73.2 and a slope of 137, Arcadian Shores Golf can give the low handicappers all they want, but from the appropriate teeing ground this low country beauty can offer amateurs of all levels a great combination of challenge and fun. The elevated greens are surrounded buy large strategically placed bunkers, but getting your tee shot into the fairway provides an acceptable approach shot from most angles. You'll want to play Arcadian Shores Golf Club again and again.

Beware of the beauty in Arcadian Shores' challenges, as seven holes of the course play along freshwater lakes, and there are 64 strategically placed sand bunkers around the Tif-dwarf Bermuda greens and 10 acres of natural lakes that border the 419 Bermuda fairways. Add to that, the elevation of many of the greens and the occasional nearby ocean breeze that comes into play on the back nine. Take note: Hole No. 13 has been named by the PGA as one of the best holes in South Carolina and revered by golfers in the Myrtle Beach area.



"How To Bunt Your Way To A Championship"

Welcome, my friends, to the sixth installment of *Straight From Hale*, where I take a look back at the previous year's Tournament and uncover one or two hidden gems that may have been witnessed

by many but discussed only by a few usually behind closed doors. It was this time two years ago that I discussed in this article the evolution of The Summit, as, that year, we had dispensed of "The best golfer never to win a Title", Ryan Crush, and "The worst golfer in Summit history", Sam Flint, and legitimized the field with the additions of Mike Kurtz and Greg Beato. Little did I know at that time that the latter duo of Kurtz and Beato would win the coveted Trophy back-to-back in the two years following. They will forever be linked as former Champions who joined the Summit together. It is at this point, however, where the similarities between these two come to an end.....

One might guess that the subject matter of this year's expose could be

Mike Kurtz' preparation, as he just finished a whirlwind tour of bucket-list golf, recently playing Pebble Beach AND Spyglass Hill Country Clubs. In addition, Mike has spent more weekends in Myrtle Beach this year than he has in Roanoke (FACT). But no, this is but a side note, as we have had Summiteers in the past who have ventured to the coast for a few winter practice rounds to no avail. No, this year's commentary is relates specifically to an ever increasing occurrence that has grabbed the attention of all the numbercrunchers who love to dig into Summit statistics in an effort to crack the code on what it takes to win!

It all began on the way home from the 2017 Summit, where Greg Beato had just hoisted the Trophy after dismantling Chris Colton for the Championship. We'd basically walked off the course, eaten lunch, handed out awards, and then jumped in our cars for the ride home without even pausing for a second to digest the fact that one of the shortest hitters on the trip had just marched through the toughest side of the bracket

to win. He who averages just 227 yards off the tee with his driver just did the unthinkable beating 3 players along the way who outdrove him by 40-60 yards on every hole! Phones were ringing constantly during the 5 hour trip home, all talking about the same phenomenon. But wait a minute..... was it a phenomenon? At the time, it just seemed like an unlikely occurrence, like catching 2 fish with a single cast or seeing Bo pour a long neck beer into Ben's waiting mouth. These things just don't happen! But it did, and we continued to our destinations just chalking it up to a perfect storm. In the off season, however, research began, and some interesting commonalities began to unfold. Going back through the record books of the past 10 Summits, an eerily familiar occurrence has gone unnoticed amongst our Champions and threatens to change the way the game is played going forward. After going back over a decade of Summit trips, with the exception of Kurtz, Bo, and Steve, the Champion of each of the past 10 years has been in the bottom 2 in Combined **Driving Distance***. (*Derived by using the Bell Curve Method where obvious non golfers' average driving distance met required exclu-

As you can see, none of these would be considered "Long Ball Hitters", yet they all won. As a matter of fact, a couple of them requested that they be allowed to play from forward tees. Digging deeper into the stats shows that each of these players hit a high percentage of fairways and, even though they all were hitting fairway woods and hybrids into par 4's, they kept the ball in play, therefore reducing the number of penalty strokes added to the overall score. I can attest, in my matches with Greg and Woody, during their respective Championship runs, they both hit 3 woods or hybrids into almost every par 4 they played. At the time, I laughed it off, saying..."Damn that's a shame", but it turns out the joke was on me!

Think about it... Ken Rogich has won it, Joe Assaid has won it! Woody won 4 times! *The numbers don't lie!!*

After long discussions with several Summit members and based on this research, I think we must all give serious consideration to the fact that maybe the proper play is to pull out a 3 wood or long iron on that first tee box and take the trouble out of play. Of course this shines a light on the long asked question, "Why can't the trio of bombers, Ben, Bradberry and Crush, win out here?" The answer?.....simple....short and straight beats long and crooked at Myrtle

Beach. I believe John and Ryan can adapt to the "Bunt and Win" strategy, they must if they ever want to hoist the Trophy. Ben, however, is the true victim here. Despite numerous attempts by mentors and friends to coerce Ben into clubbing down, his natural instincts will fight it all the way into Murrells Inlet.

Adapt and overcome! In conclusion, in an age where pro golfers are hitting the driver at every opportunity, let's face it, we're not pro golfers. We don't play pro courses (Exception: Mike Kurtz) and for most of us, golf season begins once we arrive at Myrtle. Take heed in the numbers, and if you want to shoot lower scores..... Do what 70% of our Champions in the last decade have done......Throttle Back!



vance. I think priorities also need to be relatively intact. I don't play real well hungover or tired, so, since I hate playing badly and feeling like sh*t, I probably won't ever be hungover if I'm still alive in the match play Tourney. I know there's a lot of other side games and daily games and money on other things, but I think for me, the Matchplay is the marquee game.

RM: Describe your game. What are your strength/weaknesses? When do you feel you have an advantage?

GB: [That] weekend my consistency overall was what won me the trophy. I was incredibly consistent off the tee— I must have hit like 75% of fairways, or was just off a few. I only lost 2 balls in five rounds, which is pretty good. Generally speaking, the most consistently good part of my game is my chipping and short game (which would not include putting). My weakness is my inconsistent putting. Sometimes I'm hot and

[really] good, but a lot of times it's very mediocre and my weakness. [Editor's Note: Greg has been described by competitors as a 'surprisingly good putter'.] I am certainly not a long hitter, which hurts on long courses— we're working on that this year. [Editor's Note: Tournament statisticians inform us that not only is Greg the shortest hitter ever to win the Summit Title, but the shortest hitter ever to compete in the Summit— a fact that makes his victory that much more impressive.]

RM: What is different about you from the other Summit competitors?

GB: I can prescribe narcotics. [Editor's Note: See previous *Editor's Note.*]

RM: Would you describe yourself as Type A, and how does that relate to your golf game?

GB: I don't really understand the question, but I think you're trying to call me a Type A personality, off the course. [Editor's Note: "Objection! Argumentative."] Being Type A, though, doesn't help my golf game, I'd say. I feel like I'm not a good enough golfer to not be fully focused and grinding all the time when it's a competition. I think I like to have a good time when it's not as important, and like to talk and hold a conversation.

RM: How do you respond to those that say you're foolish to buy yourself in the Calcutta?

GB: No one says that now that I came in second and won more money than anyone else

did, individually. I think you're going to find a new trend for those that have some confidence. [Editor's Note: '... said no one, ever.']

RM: Tell us what you remember about your path to the Championship as you defeated Bart, Steve, John, and finally, Chris for the Title.

GB: Bart's been my nemesis for a couple years, so it was rewarding for me to beat him down in Myrtle Beach, since he didn't think my game traveled well. [Editor's Note: Witnesses attest that Bart was simply one of many listeners when the declaration was made that Greg's game didn't travel.] I think the Blacksburg CC is rated more difficult then it really is, plus I play it all the time, so my GHIN handicap is a little lower than it should be. It was very satisfying taking Bart down for sure. [Editor's Note: Last sentence is still in response to original question about golf.]

Beating Steve was also satisfying for sure, but he had a few holes that were very uncharacteristic for him. I feel bad that I laughed at him after he hit some wood planks around a hazard on his down swing on The Gambler. [Editor's Note: Greg

mentions this incident multiple times throughout the interview, but the redundant references were omitted for brevity.]

I have never played with John when he's played well. [Editor's Note: Our interpretation is that Greg meant this as a compliment.] He shot 87, I think, both rounds [the] weekend I played with him, I think. I thought straight up I didn't have much of a chance of beating him, so actually I might be most satisfied with beating him.



The finals win was great. I don't think I've ever played anyone in a match giving them 20 shots [Editor's Note: Again, meant as some sort of twisted compliment]. Match play against someone giving that many strokes is tough— especially when your opponent would prefer monsoons over sun, which is basically what he got. Chris played well overall four rounds in a row. He was much more consistent off the tee then I remember him being before, but I was just so consistent. [Editor's Note: This portion comes across as just plain mean-spirited and braggy.]

RM: Which was your most difficult match, and why?

GB: I think Steve's match was the toughest given that it was the closest match overall. The weather was really bad that day, but I guess it was bad for everyone. [Editor's Note: An independent survey confirmed that, indeed, the weather was bad for everyone.]

RM: Which victory was the most gratifying?

GB: My goal for the weekend (if I didn't win the whole thing) was to at least advance farther than I had in the past, so I was real psyched to make it to the Semifinals for sure. Beating Steve will never get old and is always gratifying for sure.

RM: If given a choice, which of those competitors would you be most and least anxious to face again, and why?

GB: Honestly it doesn't matter to me who I play. I loved taking down SageCreek for sure, and would love to relive that moment every year.

RM: In examining the 2017 Summit field, take a moment to give us a short thought or impression of each competitor.

GB:

- o Bo Blankenship: Competitor; How he remembers all the games and strokes, I don't have a clue
- o John Bradberry: We need to get that guy to The Club. I think he would play better with other things on his mind
- o Chris Colton: I feel bad he burned his pants/jacket



- o Phil Dick: Seems like he could be a better golfer with a little practice. He hit some of the best drives I saw this weekend
- o Bart Edmunds: There's so much planning he has to do, it's a wonder he can concentrate on his golf game at all
- o Ben Fry: I think a course in course management might really propel him to Summit glory
- o Steve Hale: I really wonder what he was like 25 years ago at these golf weekends
- o John Hudson: Enjoyed sharing Jack and Jill bathroom with him— except for his late night deuce dropping. We put a hurting on that poor room
- o Mike Kurtz: Consistent; Still surprised he lost in his first round match
- o Jeff Parker: I feel bad he's not at his peek physical condition. Super great guy
- o Ken Rogich: I think he weathered the conservative hand grenades that were thrown at him really well

RM: In your opinion, of the current Summit

field, who is most and least likely to win next year's Summit, and why?

GB: Most: Me— someone's due to be first back-to-back in Summit history.

Least: Jeff Parker— vision is important in golf, as is actually participating.


RM: If you could make one change to the Summit, what would it be?
