2018 Recap

As has become tradition since Kurtz's move to Myrtle Beach, John and Hudson drove down early Thursday to meet Kurtz and play Tidewater in the afternoon. Bo and Ryan, Ben and Phil, and Bart, Steve, and Greg rolled-out Friday morning and met at Clarence's for the customary pre-Summit breakfast. Ryan at first confused, then captivated our waitress, Missy, by the quantity of food he consumed. So consumed was Missy by Ryan, a man after her own heart, that she volunteered to accompany him to Myrtle and be our designated driver and beer wench for the weekend. She volun-



teered to trade places with Steve, who may have considered it had the apron fit.

Steve eagerly offered to be in charge of directing us to the course, and an otherwise uneventful trip quickly devolved into a navigational debacle. While we arrived at Myrtlewood right on time, our tee-time was, unfortunately, at Myrtle Beach National— which was still 20 minutes away. Apparently, Apple Maps was using some old Garmin maps from the late-'80's, because as we raced to make the final tee-time, we found ourselves rolling through random neighborhoods in the vicinity of, but not connected to the clubhouse. In the end, it was a beautiful day, Ben shot 74 with a double-bogey on 16, and Steve was relieved of his 'Navigator' title.

Afterward, as various factions of the group decided on dinner plans, Ben said he and Phil would like to join several of us at our usual, King Kong Sushi, until he overheard Bo say he wasn't sure where he was going to go. Oddly and suddenly, Ben wasn't sure where he and Phil were going to go either. John, Hudson, and Kurtz ended up at Hooters, while Greg, Steve, Ken, and Bart went to King Kong Sushi, which was fabulous as always.

To say there was some confusion regarding Chris' arrival would be to understate the case. Chris had indicated a month earlier that he was considering flying to Myrtle as opposed to driving. Steve volunteered to bring clubs for him if he did, so he wouldn't have to fly with his or rent. Apparently, Chris' Valentine's Day text to Bart confirming that he booked his flight and indicating his arrival time was lost in the avalanche of texts received that day. And, Steve and Chris hadn't had any further communication since their initial exchange, so no one had given anymore thought to Chris flying until Bart received a text on his drive down stating that Chris needed to be picked up at the airport at 8:30pm and to make sure we remembered his clubs. After agonizing through dinner over what to do, the group reassured Bart that the only course of action at that point was for Chris to Uber to the condo while Steve raced to the PGA Superstore to rent clubs before they closed, While Chris had apparently heard of Uber, he had never actually used it, so he forked-over \$50 for a cab to drive him from the airport to the condo. When the group arrived at the condo from renting his clubs, Chris was not a happy-camper. While Bart was doing is best to talk Chris down and deescalate the situation, he noticed a set of clubs in the corner. When asked about the clubs, Chris said he decided to bring his own clubs, but forgot to relay that fact to Steve who now, after scrambling to round up clubs at the eleventh hour, is stuck with a set of rental clubs pre-paid for four days. Since he now resides in the area, Mike had planned on being in Myrtle a couple of extra days anyway, so he volunteered to drop Chris at the airport.


After the final round, Mike brings the car around and Chris rolls up with his hard travel case only to discover that his case will not fit in Mike's car. Several assisted Chris in installing the Uber app on his phone and calling transportation which arrived shortly. The group bid Chris farewell and piled in the Jeep toward home, relieved that Chris was able to get everything worked out. Approximately 30 minutes later, Bart receives a text from Chris that the Philadelphia airport is closed, so he has to rent a car and is drive back to Delaware. Consensus was that the whole 'flying thing' didn't really work out all that well.

After a long first day, everyone retired to their rooms and watched UVA make history by being the first #1 seed in NCAA Tournament history to lose to a #16 seed— University of Maryland – Baltimore County.

On a side note, Steve had two Summer Shanties on the golf course and two Angry Orchards at King Kong Sushi over about a 4 hour period. He proceeded back to the condo at 9:00, and according to Ben, did not stop to shower, speak to anyone, or pass 'Go', but went straight to his room and passed out completely. Yet another example of the evils of binge-drinking.

After Ben's 74 in the practice round, there was an over-under bet of 85 in his first Tournament Round. John and Ryan took the under; Bo and Hudson took the over, but no one was allowed to say anything to Ben, because it would influence his performance. (John and Ryan won; Ben shot 83) In the actual matches, John eked-by Bart 5/3, Ben trounced his daddy, Bo, 2/1, Ryan beat Phil 3/2, and Kurtz snuck-by Ken 4/2. With regard to the team Stableford; Bo, Ben, Phil, and Ryan won with 145 points. Bart, John, Steve, and Hudson were second with 142. And, Greg, Chris, Ken, and Mike captured third with 118. After the round, the group ate at the snack bar at the course, trudged to the PGA Superstore for the annual, obligatory visit, and then went home to get cleaned up. Greg picked-up pizzas for the traditional pre-Calcutta meal.

During the Calcutta, Steve held court and explained why he had a certain amount of respect for Jerry Sandusky but not Penn State, why alter boys part their hair in the middle, and the origin of the nickname 'Country Nut'. He also prescribed treatment for a 'semen knot' from which he felt sure a certain member of our group was suffering. No one left the condos that night, which was a disappointment to John and Ryan, who said everybody bailed, so they just sat around.



Day 2 started at Hot Stacks which was a no-go because the line was out the door, so most went to a 'hidden gem' called The Bagel Port which was fantastic. It seemed that the more Ryan drank, the better he played. Steve, Hudson, and Chris all lost the tie-breaker to Bradberry, Ben, and Mike, respectively. Apparently, Hudson was gasping for oxygen coming down the stretch as Ben continued to apply pressure. After being 3-up with 6 to play, poor Steve four-putted the 18th hole to lose the tie-breaker to John. When Ben made the mistake of pointing-out this fact later, Steve went straight to the 'nuclear option' by telling Rachel that Ben's cup-size enabled him to garner more handicap strokes. The 4-Man, 2-Best Ball was won by Ben, Phil, Hudson, and Ken with a -12. Second place was Bradberry, Steve, Chris, and Mike at -6, and third place went to Bo, Bart, Greg, and Ryan at -5. Phil Dick led the Calcutta after the first day, though not without controversy regarding several rule discrepancies. Phil lost a ball that the group was fairly certain had been picked-up by another foursome. Phil hit

a cart, as did John. Phil took his penalty like a man. John did not. After repeatedly holding-up the group behind them, John decided to just take an unplayable lie, rather than going back to re-tee. In his haste, he hit his own cart as Mike darted in front of him at the last second. John threw a hissy fit and ranted that if that was enforced against him, he was going to start enforcing all of the other official rules of golf that everyone seems to ignore. Apparently, Mike was not having a good day either and was seen throwing clubs along with his own little hissy fit, as well. The group split-up for dinner with part of the group going to Nacho Hippo and others to Bimini's. We came back, got cleaned up, and settled up bets. Phil Dick led the Calcutta after the first day. There were several discrepancies with regards to the rules.

The third day started with a Bojangle's run and breakfast in the condo before heading to Arcadian Shores, which was very


close. Arcadian Shores is a great track, and everyone expressed interest in adding it to the rotation going forward. Weather-wise, it ended up being the best day yet. Though it starting off a little rainy, it cleared-up and turned out beautiful. With regard to the Matches, Kurtz beat Crush 3/2, while Ben beat John 2/1. Ryan insisted on riding with Mike, even though Ken was his partner and Mike was his opponent. Steve was not happy about this obvious breach of protocol. In the 2-man Stableford, Bart and Greg won with a score of 73, followed by John and Phil at 69. After the first day of the Duel-Day Double-Dude Dual, Ken and Chris were actually leading at -5. The group went to an old favorite, Liberty Steakhouse (home of the baby-bird), afterward for the Summit Dinner. Ken and Phil bought drinks since Phil won the Calcutta and Ken owned him. Bart and Ben artfully tied for second, so as to avoid buying drinks.

At dinner, as a family sitting at the end of the room was leaving, what appeared to be a daughter, a very curvy and

slightly disreputable-looking young 'lady' named Fox, handed Ryan a free pass to the 'Treasure Cove' and invited the group to stop by. Ryan thanked her profusely and asked if it was 'laser tag or something'. I not sure Fox even understood the exchange as everyone erupted in laughter.

After dinner, many got cleaned up and took a nap before the Yankee Swap— which was a lot of fun, as usual. Everybody was pretty much out of gas at that point and just sat around watching American Idol and/or going to bed early. John, Ben, Ryan, and Phil organized their own little fourman hot tub party. Mike was a ghost as he drifted between his house, his Summit friends, and his private Spanish lessons. On a side note, Chris and Ken were having inner-ear problems or stumbled into the Devil's Triangle as the kept getting lost, notably, going to Broadway At The Beach and Liberty Steakhouse and Arcadian Shores Golf Course— which is walking distance directly across the street from the condominiums.

Weather was perfect for the final day—83 and sunny when we finished. (Editor's Note: It was 43° when we stopped at Dodge's Store for wings and a bathroom break on the way back.) We raced to King's North and arrived just before the first tee-time. The first group got little to no warmup and Chris had to be extracted from the bathroom to go to the tee. Ryan, who, apparently, hasn't fully embraced the spirit of the Summit, was not happy about final day grouping, as he felt everyone should get to play with whomever they like, which is interesting, because one would expect Ryan most likely to appreciate structure and predictability. Ben breached etiquette, by insisting he ride with Phil the final day, though Greg was his DDDDD partner. Mike was kind in not pushing the issue, knowing full-well that it





would've forced Ben out of his comfort zone and further reduced his chance at his first Title. Steve complained the entire trip about having to give Ryan and Mike shots, but only did so to draw attention to the fact that he had to give Ryan and Mike shots—which he would never want any other way. After a couple of incidents, Hudson offered Chris instruction on green etiquette and not trampling other's line. Hudson's voice is loud and Chris' feelings are soft, so Chris mistakenly thought Hudson was mad. Apparently, as Chris approached him to apologize while walking off the green, Hudson ignored Chris, shoulder-bumped him, and kept walking. In the aftermath, it turns out that Hudson was playing poorly, in his own head, and barely remembered the incident. He and Chris exchanged love notes afterward and made-up. Chris invited him to a sleepover, but John had a sensitivity workshop all weekend.

After as much as a 7 up lead, Mike put Ben out of his misery 5/3. Mike tried his best to give it away, but the gods, and Ben, wouldn't allow it. On 16, he blocked his tee-shot into the woods, but it kicked-out into the fairway. He hit his approach shot into water, but it skipped out onto the bank. He then chipped it close, only to miss a short par putt—the only outcome on the hole over which he had complete control. Phil showed a rare glimpse of emotion as he cussed Steve for parking/leaving his cart in the fairway on The Gambler, preventing Phil (not known for lollygagging) and his group from teeing-off. There was some old-school grumbling about the SMS[®] and how it rewarded poor play. Some still can't get their mind around the Summit mission after all these years. They could take a page out of a dusty, old playbook and simply play bad to take advantage of the system. It may cost them hundreds of dollars in side-bets, but they'd get the last laugh by picking-up a few extra skins or a share of the Individual Team Title. Despite repeated and relentless attacks on the philosophy and very structure of the Summit that make it special, the Committee has resisted every effort to make it 'like other golf trips'. There is a reason the Summit has endured, and it's safe to say, it's not due to similarity to other trips.

20 years! That's a long time to maintain a group and a tradition! As the oldest remaining Summiteer, I was 37 when our annual spring trip became the Millennium Invitational Golf Summit. Our newest/youngest competitor, Adam, was still 5 months away from blowing out the candles on his 6th birthday cake as eight of us stood on the first tee of Arcadian Shores on that chilly March morning in 2000. In addition to me, Bo and Steve are the only two of the original eight never to have missed a Summit start. Chris is the other member of this 20th anniversary trip who was there when it all began.

The Summit vision is, and always has been that of a Tournament where everyone has an fair chance to win-regardless of handicap— with the ultimate Prize going to the competitor with the grit to persevere and withstand the onslaught of four grueling rounds against fellow combatants. The Summit is four days with twelve separate contests and opportunities to win. Every day is a new day, so if your game is off, there's always tomorrow or a teammate to pick you up. The Summit is a well-oiled machine that, once set in motion, takes on a life of its own where each afternoon holds not only the excitement of updated standings and awarding of daily prizes, but the anticipation of the next day's pairings and updated handicaps. The Summit has endured for 20 years, not in spite of, but rather, because it's different. Enjoy it while it lasts, because nothing lasts forever. . .

Inducted 2014

As one of the founding "Fabled Eight", Steve has never missed an Event through the first 16 years of the MIGS. For many years, Steve helped Woody in selecting and procuring the annual Tournament Gift. In his Summit career, he has accumulated 19 Matchplay victories, 4 Calcutta wins, 2 SMC Runner-ups, 1 High Net, 4 Individual Team Championship, 5 Low Nets, and 3 SMC Titles. His 2013 Low Net pushed him over the top to receive the honor of being the first Summit Hall of Fame Inductee. In 2014, Steve became only the second Player in Summit history to pass \$1,000 in career earnings.

Steve is a very eligible bachelor and devoted father. Interestingly, he is deeply involved with his church where he used to work closely with at-risk teenage girls. He currently serves as as Virginia Tech football's 'Red Hat' and finds time to act as Commissioner of the Roanoke Valley Wrestling Association.



The Summit Hall of Fame represents Steve's 3rd hall of fame induction, as he is also a member of the Roanoke Valley Wrestling Hall of Fame (for his officiating) and the Patrick Henry High School Sports Hall of Fame for his exploits on the mat and gridiron. In his spare time, Steve excels, not only in golf, but pool, bowling, and, much to his surprise, darts. He is also, possibly, the 3rd best Cornhole player at the Summit. Participants will share one of four luxury 3-bedroom resort condominiums conveniently situated in the heart of Scottsdale, AZ. Each condo comes with *free* in **-room calls to U.S. and Canada**, *free* in-room wireless internet, and cable TV.

Plan to arrive to the greater Phoenix area no later than 11am the morning of Friday, March 15, 2019 if you plan to participate in the practice round at beautiful Las Sendas Golf Club arranged and negotiated exclusively for Summit Participants by the Committee. We will checkout prior to the final round on the morning of Tuesday, March 19, 2019.

In addition to the aforementioned accommodations, tournament entry fee includes rental of three **luxury vehicles** exclusively for Summit use while in the greater Phoenix-Scottsdale area, four Tournament rounds of **golf with cart** on four luxurious Scottsdale area courses, **range balls**, tournament **banquet**, tournament **gifts/souvenirs**, **taxes/tips**, and over \$1,000 in daily and Tournament **cash prizes**. Over \$100 in prize-money will be awarded each day with another \$250 awarded to the individual winners on the final day of the Summit.

Troon North requires a forecaddie for each group for \$30 per person plus a \$20 recommended tip. The only additional expenses relate to out-of-pocket expenditures for food, drinks, souvenirs, the Calcutta, wagers and side-action, and/or entertainment (if you like that sort of thing).

Handicapping, etc.

The Summit Handicap System®

Initial handicaps have been determined by calculating 90% of last year's Tournament ending handicap. Individual handicaps will be adjusted daily by one-third (33%) of the difference between a participant's actual score and his most recent handicap.

EXAMPLE: Previous year ending Handicap = 11. Current year initial Handicap: 11 x 90% = 10. 10 handicapper shoots 14 over par. Adjustment would be 1.33 ((14-10=4)/3=1.33), rounded down to 11.

Amendment 2014-01: Participants receiving a bye in the Play-in Round, will receive only 1/2 of the customary handicap adjustment as a result of their Day One score.

Amendment 2010-01: FOR HANDICAPPING PURPOSES ONLY, once a match is closed-out, neither competitor may score more than a bogey on any remaining hole in that round

Amendment 2009-01: FOR HANDICAPPING PURPOSES ONLY, no more than a double-bogey will be counted on any individual hole for single-digit handicappers, and no more than a triple-bogey will be counted on any individual hole for double-digit handicappers.

- B. No mulligans
- C. Ball may be moved one club-length in *own* fairway
- D. When in doubt about lost or out-of-bounds ball, play provisional
- E. Double-par stroke limit per hole (No limit for match play purposes)

 - 1) Last three holes

It's a premium golf course smack dab in the Sonora Desert. The golf course at the Legend Trail Golf Club features broad fairways, diminutive bunkering and tees placed on islands, and has been called one of the Top 100 golf courses by Golf Magazine. The magazine also gives Legend Trail 4.5 stars out of five among its Best Places to Play, and has one of the Top 100 Woman-Friendly Fairways, according to Golf For Women magazine. Panoramas include local sites like Pinnacle Peak, and a round at Legend Trail Golf Club gives all levels of golfer several different shot-making options. Golf a late-afternoon round on Friday or Saturday, and head back to the Trail's End Grill from 4 to 6 p.m. for specials on drinks and appetizers.

Adjacent to the Phoenix Mountain Reserve, the course tumbles across a rugged landscape that offers plenty of changes in elevation. 
